A Patriot is Detained in Nigeria

JONATHAN GOVERNMENT ARRESTS UNITED STATES-BASED NEWSPAPER COLUMNIST, OKEY NDIBE, AT MURTALA MOHAMMED AIRPORT IN LAGOS

Saharareporters just learned minutes ago that the SSS at MMIA in Lagos arrested Okey Ndibe and detained, a columnist and US professor.

Mr Ndibe arrived on Turkish airlines at 9:31 PM (Nigerian Time). An immigration officer handed his passport to an State Security Service (SSS) who instructed him to get his luggage and come with them. One SSS officer named "Mr George" told Mr. Ndibe his supervisor needed to see him on the first floor at room 1062.

After being held for several hours he was released after he was made to give his Nigerian address, but just before he was released, his Nigerian passport was seized by the agency. They requested that he appears before the Kingsway Road office of the agency on Monday to interview with their director for further action.

Okey Ndibe is an American scholar and a columnist for the *Nigerian Sun* newspaper as well as several websites including *SaharaReporters.com*. He is also on the English Literature faculty at Trinity College in Connecticut and Brown University in Rhode Island.

STOP THE HARASSMENT OF OKEY NDIBE

The Nigeria Democratic Liberty Forum (NDLF) condemns unequivocally the arrest, detention, harassment and the breach of the fundamental human rights of Dr Okey Ndibe; by the Nigerian government.

Dr Okey Ndibe is a patriotic Nigerian, social crusader, journalist and activist. He is also the Speaker of the Nigerian Peoples Parliament in the Diaspora (NPPID). He was arrested, detained, harassed and his United States and Nigerian passports were seized when he entered Nigeria through the international airport in Lagos.

After several hours interrogation, he was released and instructed to report to the security service agency during the week. His passports have not been returned.

The unwarranted harassment of this eminent Nigerian citizen who has deployed his literary and writing skills to speak truth to power by the State Security Service (SSS) is reminiscent of the dark days in the history of our country when the rights of citizens were flagrantly breached.

The NDLF calls on the Nigerian government to **stop and desist** from further harassing Dr Okey Ndibe. The instruction that he should continuously report to the SSS is an act of intimidation and possibly a prelude to falsely accuse him of spurious crimes as a basis for his detention in Nigeria.

If the Nigerian government does not immediately return his passport and stop his harassment, the NDLF shall instruct lawyers in Nigeria to approach the courts for the enforcement of his fundamental human rights as guaranteed by the Nigerian constitution and the United Nations Declaration on Human Rights. Also we shall commence an international campaign to call the attention of the rest of the world to this drift to State terrorism.
